

FHFD Knocks Down Fire

In May, firefighters were called to action for a structure fire at a local residence, where they were dispatched for a kitchen fire. Upon arrival, Engine 1373 stood by, ready with a dropped "dry line" since it was initially determined that police officers were able to extinguish the kitchen fire using dry chemicals. However, as firefighters very quickly checked the home, a fire in the second floor bedroom was discovered. The dry line was put into action and water from a River Road hydrant was used to put out the fire, using additional manpower arriving on Engine 1375.

Chief Kane commented that it was the quick actions of the first responding police officers plus the teamwork of the firefighters that prevented any injuries or further damage to the home. "I am very proud of the professionalism of our firefighters. This was the first major fire we have had in eight years, and the hundreds of hours of drills, training and preparation showed in their diligence, their adherence to safety and the way they knocked that fire down," said Chief Kane.

Alert! Phone Charger Catches Fire!



Recently, two teenagers were home alone when a cell phone lightning charger that was in a beach bag exploded and caught on fire. Luckily, the fire was put out before anyone was hurt or major damage occurred.

Please check online to see if your chargers are safe or if there have been recalls. And never, ever touch a burning object or move it. Call 911! Most important lesson:

Teach everyone in your family to use a fire

A Message from Chief Kane



It is an honor to serve the citizens of Fair Haven and the members of the Fair Haven Volunteer Fire Company as Chief of the Fair Haven Fire Department for 2014. I was fortunate to grow up in the area and am a graduate of Rumson-Fair Haven Regional High School. After college, I moved out of NJ and lived in Washington, DC, Virginia, and Connecticut. I had always planned on coming back to raise my family

here, and, finally, after 16 years, we returned. Less than a month after I moved back I had the pleasure of taking my children to the Fireman's Fair and watching them enjoy the rides and games with all of their cousins. Some of the rides were ones I had gone on as a child. I wanted to give back to the community and teach my children what it means to be a volunteer. Although I wanted to join the Fire Department, I wasn't sure I would be able to give it the requisite time, due to my daily work commute. My wife introduced me to Mike Reddy, the Chief at the time. After speaking with him, I reasoned that if Mike Reddy could commute and still dedicate enough time to rise to the position of Chief, then I could join the department to try and help out.

It is now several years later and I am proud to have been elected to serve as your Chief. My job is made that much easier by the dedicated volunteers who spend countless hours serving their friends and neighbors in the community. The volunteers serve in different capacities, including the Fire Department, the First Aid Squad, the Fire Police, the Water Rescue Unit, and the Auxiliary. All of these members dedicate their time to serve their community. We all realize that when someone dials 911, it is one of our neighbors who is in need of help.

Residents often ask me, "What can we do to be safe and help?" Here are several ways that citizens of Fair Haven can help us serve you better:

- Please yield to cars with the blue lights on when they are heading to the scene or firehouse. We know it may be frustrating to have to wait, but remember, they are headed to help someone or to keep FHFD members and residents safe.
- Get a fire extinguisher or aerosol extinguishing system and learn how to properly use them.
- Make sure that your house number is big enough for us to see and well illuminated.
- Trim back bushes and trees from fire hydrants and gas meters.
- Make sure that your home has carbon monoxide detectors and smoke detectors.
- Change the batteries in your detectors twice a year.
- ♦ Keep your hydrant clear of snow during the winter.
- Get your chimney cleaned.
- ◆ Clear a path in your basement to the electrical panel, furnace, and hot water heater.
- Never leave food cooking unattended.
- Use flashlights instead of candles during power outages.

A message for parents: There is one more thing you can do to help us. Every October the Fire Department provides a Fire Safety lesson to Fair Haven students from pre-K to 5th grade. We teach them what to do in the event of an emergency. Every year we ask the students if they conduct fire drills at home. Only a few children raise their hands. My goal: This October, I would like to see ALL of the students raise their hands when we ask them if their families conduct drills at home. Thank you for your continued support. 

Here's some FHFD math for you: 3 Families + Tradition + Dedication = 504 years of service to our Fair Haven!



February 25, 2014. Ice and Snow Don't Stop Fires

FHFD conducts drills all year round. In this drill, firefighters practiced winter fire fighting skills on a home that was donated by the owners prior to them demolishing it before building a new house. Using equipment under very cold and icy conditions can be treacherous. One way our



residents help out is by digging out hydrants after a snow storm. This allows FHFD to immediately lay hose, charge the lines with water, and fight the fire.

We thank Burke Builders for offering up a few houses this year for our drills.

First Aiders Needed!


Your help is vital. On average, every year, one in five Fair Haven households call us for help. But getting an ambulance crew together quickly, especially during weekdays, has gotten tough.

Weekend calls. But, as happens in many communities, the majority of Fair Haven's first aiders and firefighters work out of town, and only a few members have been available to respond during weekday daytime hours. Lately some of those daytime regulars have moved away or started new jobs, and suddenly, it has become much harder to put together the three-person crew we require for each call.

If you have the time and the energy, we would like you to volunteer for our Squad. Physical strength is useful—patients sometimes have to be carried up or down stairs—but not essential. We now have motorized cots and other devices that help with some of the lifting. Afraid you'll faint at the sight of blood? Calls involving trauma are very rare. The vast majority of calls are for people who feel sick, short of breath, in pain, have fallen down, etc. If you are uncomfortable on a call, there are many ways to help out on the scene or back at the firehouse.

Joining the Squad is not a trivial commitment. It requires 60 hours of training spread out over 2 months to get started as a first aider. You are expected to attend monthly meetings and training exercises, go on about a quarter of all calls annually, help out on fire department calls, and be available for special events like a parade, race and of course, at our eight day Fair. You will also be part of the Fair Haven Fire Company, our parent organization, which has a long and proud history of serving the town.

Despite the effort required, belonging to the Fair Haven First Aid Squad is enormously satisfying. You are helping your neighbors when they need you most. You are acquiring lifesaving skills that can help you and your family at any time. You will join a community of caring, generous, enthusiastic people, who will become a lot like



"family" over time. Do not worry if you are a newcomer to town. Members include those whose families hobnobbed with George Washington (well almost), to those who are still unpacking boxes.

OKAY, I'M IN. NOW WHAT?

We train members when we have several new volunteers available at one time. It may take a few weeks or months before classes start. They generally take place in the evening, two nights a week, for about a month. A criminal background check will be completed.

Once you're a member of the Squad be prepared to jump out of your chair or climb out of bed, even when you don't feel like it. You will have a pager, a link on your smartphone, and horns will blast (three times) from the firehouse to tell you that you are needed.

Do it. You will be glad you did. We are.
